Monday 15th February: the historical walking tour



On Monday afternoon, we have the opportunity to do a walking tour around the ancient city of Galway

The guide explains us its origins and the most fundamental historical events. Galway was founded with the original name of "Dur Gallimhe" in 1124, by the King of Connacht. During the Middle Ages, Galway was ruled by an oligarchy of **fourteen merchant** families (twelve who claimed to be of Norman origin and two of Irish origin). These were the "Tribes of Galway". The city thrived on international trade and it became the principal Irish port for trade with Spain and France; maybe for its popularity in 1477 Galway was visited by the famous italian navigator Christopher Columbus . In the modern age Galway passed under control of the United Kingdom until 1922, the year of the Irish indipendence, after many conflicts with Great Britain

The breath-taking experience to **the cliffs of Moher**




On Tuesday afternoon we pass a beautiful time on **The cliffs of Moher**, one of the most famous tracts of Irish landscape that every year attracts thousand of tourists.

It proves to be very diffcult to take some photos because of the very strong wind, but despite all we enjoy a creepy experience!

During the trip to the cliffs the excellent bus driver and guide shows us some features of the Irish landscape such as the characteristic stone hills which were given their shape by a big meteorite between twelve and ten thousand years ago. He also tells us about the hard life of the small rural villages of farmers around Galway, such as Kilcogan, and their endurance during the submission to the UK.
